

Policy directions

Education systems should integrate case-based and problem-based learning and recognise competencies developed through participatory methods.

Education institutions, civil society, and labour market actors should coordinate more closely to align curricula with current social and economic realities.

International exchanges should be directly linked to structured local implementation phases with dedicated support for community-level initiatives.

Governments and regional networks should establish structured V4–Africa dialogue platforms to ensure continuity and long-term strategic cooperation.

The UnityFusion is an international initiative connecting organisations from the Visegrad Group (V4) and West Africa to strengthen cooperation in education, leadership development, and civic engagement, equipping participants with competencies aligned with the social and economic realities of the 21st century.

The project combines international learning events with locally implemented impact initiatives. Through case-based and problem-based learning formats, participants analyse real-life challenges, develop context-sensitive solutions, and implement concrete actions within their communities.

Connect training activities with follow-up local initiatives to ensure real-world application.



Combine structured analytical tools with creative approaches to support balanced decision-making.
